Remembering Stanley Kavan Sr.

Stanley Kavan, one of the founding members of CPS, died in October at the age of 100. He won several poetry awards and judged national poetry competitions for Milford's Fine Arts Council for many years. As well as being a community activist, Stanley had a notable career as an executive at Columbia Records. He was instrumental in the careers of a number of leading recording artists. He was also involved with recording books for Connecticut's program for the blind and physically handicapped. He will be missed.

Poet in the Spotlight: Ellen Hirning Schmidt

For decades Ellen Hirning Schmidt wrote poems but did not pursue publication. When she turned 70, however, something shifted, and the desire to share her work outweighed her feelings of vulnerability and fear of rejection. An acquaintance read a few of her poems on display at an art show and encouraged her to find a publisher. Now, a few years later, Schmidt's poetry is widely published. She has won an award in a CPS contest, and been named a finalist in American Writers Review. She's also received the Helen Kay Chapbook Prize, a Pushcart nomination, and published her first full-length poetry collection, Armed to the Teeth, through Antrim House Books. The poems in her book reflect the tug between despair and hope experienced frequently by the poet, and by so many of us. Sample poems from this book can be found at https://

Her goal in writing is to connect with others. Schmidt says, "I think a poem can be the shortest distance between two people." She also feels that through the specific details of a poem, the universal can be found.

Schmidt's connection with CPS "has been nothing short of wonderful!" In her experience, highlights include "the President's workshops. I learn much from the work of fellow poets and their valuable, specific, and kind comments. **Pat Mottola** and **Vivian Shipley** set the tone, provide their insights, and guide us brilliantly. I also love the POPs—so many poets and cultures I knew nothing, or almost nothing, about."

Schmidt runs a class, "Writing Through the Rough Spots," which helps participants use writing to create clarity about challenging situations. The classes met in person until the pandemic hit; since then, they have been online. Students range in age from teens to seniors, and have come from all over the United States, as well as from 15 other countries. During the summer, she leads week-long writing workshops at Star Island, New Hampshire.


Schmidt loves to read. A couple of poetry books that have captured her interest recently are *Healing the Divide: Poems of Kindness & Connection, edited* by James Crews with a preface by Ted Kooser, and *43 Poems for People Who Don't Read Poetry*, from the editors of *Abandoned Mine*.

She lives with her husband on two acres that they've turned into a nature preserve. "To some it might seem like neglect, but it has been purposeful in attracting birds, insects, a huge variety of plants. I have become increasingly interested in plants, which represent 85% of all living beings on the earth! Like many poets, my observations about nature lead to insights, and of course metaphors."



New Books by CPS Members

Each poem in *Pickle Verse: Half-Sour Humor,* **Ed Ahern's** new book of verse, offers a fresh perspective on everyday experiences, from the quirks of human behavior to the mysteries of existence. The poems invite readers to both chuckle and reflect.



Sandy Carlson, Poet Laureate of Woodbury, had published *Breath Work,* her ninth collection of poems. The sonnets in the book emerge from the inner peace and courage that come with honestly facing life on its terms. Describing the work, Carlson says, "This is an edgier work than my previous few collections. These poems won't shrug off the madness of our world any more than they will succumb to it. This is to say, these poems take a position on the madness, and they push back."

Proceeds from the sale of *Breath Work* will benefit the pensioners in Kosiv, Ukraine, who are struggling to survive during Russia's full-scale invasion of its peaceful neighbor. Highlights from recent books by **Debbie Gilbert** and **Pegi Deitz Shea** will be shared at the Hoppin Gallery in the Barney Library, 71 Main Street in Farmington on February 10th at 1 pm. Debbie's book is called *Deirdre* and Pegi's is titled *The Weight of Kindling*.

Deirdre takes place on Ireland's Blasket Islands, which have been unpopulated since the 1950's.

Joyce Sidman has called Pegi's book "A book that sings, celebrates, and mourns. Shea gathers passion and grit from a life well-lived, and offers us a fierce love of the journey."

Luisa Caycedo-Kimura and Nadia Sims will be the featured readers for the Riverwood Poetry Series on December 13th at 7 pm. The event will take place at Real Art Ways, 56 Arbor Street in Hartford. An Open mic opportunity precedes the featured readers. Luisa is a Colombian-born writer, translator, educator, and former attorney. She has won numerous awards for her poetry. Nadia is the author of the book *A Soft Place to Land.* Poetry has helped her get through difficult times, and she hopes that others will see their challenges reflected in her work, and feel more comfortable talking about their feelings.

The museum is located at 56 Lexington Avenue in New Britain. Antoinette is the author of three full-length poetry collections: These Women You Gave Me, Icarus in Love, and Psalm of the Sunflower. A printmaker and collage artist, Antoinette Brim-Bell has exhibited both poetry and monoprints in Jazz: An exhibition of Poetry, Prints, and Photography at the Sumner McKnight Crosby Jr. Gallery in New Haven, and Sheroes, in partnership with the Alliance of Women Veterans at the Grove in New Haven.
